The use of prepositions with effect is a common source of confusion in English. To say "Se estudi el efecto de la temperatura en la actividad" can be translated to either "The temperature effect on/in the activity was studied." The choice of preposition depends on the context, but "in" is used more often when referring to living things, although "on" is also appropriate. For example: "The effect of diet in/on children." A good dictionary, such as Oxford Advanced Learner's Dictionary, can provide guidance on preposition selection. According to the dictionary, "effect" selects the preposition "on". However, either "on" or "in" works, but they function differently. "On" precedes whatever is directly affected, whereas "in" often specifies a subgroup studied or a specific context. Prepositions are notoriously difficult in English, and many options can give slight variations in connotation. It's best to check with well-educated native speakers of English rather than relying solely on a dictionary. A dictionary may not list all viable prepositional uses. For non-native speakers, mastering prepositions can be a challenge. Even for native speakers, it's essential to consider the context and nuances when choosing prepositions. In some cases, "with effect from" is used instead of "effective from", but this is considered a common mistake. A more natural way to phrase it in US English would be: "She will be stationed in the Mainland office effective 7 April 2011." When using the passive voice, it appears that her superiors will station her in Mainland. However, if she's her own boss and took the decision, it's better to say: "She will station herself in her Mainland office." The difference between "effect" and "affect" is often misunderstood. It would be helpful to provide real-life examples instead of asking about general rules. For instance, you can say: "Does it affect me?" or "Does it have an effect on me?" These words are often misused as verbs, but neither normally follows a prepositional phrase with "on". Although the speaker in the movie dialog is unsure whether "affect" or "effect" was used, linguists generally agree that both words are verbs. The confusion often arises from their similar spelling and pronunciation, but they have distinct meanings. In general, affect refers to a verb meaning to influence or have an impact on something, while effect refers to a noun meaning a result or consequence. For instance, in the phrase "The cold weather will affect my mood," "affect" means that the weather is influencing or having an impact on the speaker's mood. On the other hand, in the phrase "The new policy will effect a change in our company's operations," "effect" means that the policy is causing a change to occur.
